### Butterfly gardening tips:

1. Provide nectar plants for adults, native host plants for their caterpillars.
2. Plant many large patches of these plants in the same area if possible.
3. Provide sunny areas for basking, and for the sun-loving plants that butterflies (and native bees!) love.
4. Provide water, if possible.
5. Avoid planting exotic plants which may harm butterflies, or someday may become invasive.
6. Talk about butterflies and their habitat needs with your neighbors!
